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SAN JUAN ATZINGO CHURCH CELEBRATES 50 YEARS FOR THE NGIVA PEOPLE



(by Jeanne Austin - see her picture below) On Sunday the 17th of March the largest church in San Juan Atzingo celebrated their 50th anniversary. It was really the anniversary of the start of the evangelical movement in the village. In mid-March of 1974 the first nine believers were baptized. At the anniversary event there were over 450 people present, most from the village, but some from neighboring towns and

elsewhere. The other two evangelical churches in the village took part in the celebration. There were three messages, one by a pastor from a neighboring village and the other two by native Ngiva speakers, and there was special music. A goat barbecue dinner ended the celebration.



Fires in the CUICATEC AREA

De Nicolás:

Ya se logró controlar el incendio pero en otros pueblos cercanos todavía siguen combatiendo el incendio

Pido oración por ellos San Andrés Pápalo y San Sebastián Tlacolula

En Ti'uvi muchos perdieron su cosecha de maíz.

Translated goes, Nicolás says, "We finally succeeded in controlling the fire in our lands here in Ti'uvi (Santa María Papalo). Other Towns close by are still fighting the fires. I ask for prayer for



those in San Andrés Pápalo and San Sebastián Tlacolula. Here in Santa María many have lost their corn harvest."

We are very concerned for our friends. For subsistence farmers this is a disaster of the highest degree. They live from harvest to harvest. To lose a harvest, especially when *many* lose their harvests, the results for the whole community, indeed all the Cuicatec communities can be catastrophic.

If any of you wish to send funds to our Cuicatec friends because of this disaster we will see to it that the funds reach the local church there so that these good people can be helped. The Mexican government sometimes helps in the situation, but distribution has often been a problem. We are moved and concerned. We will be in contact with Nicolás asking how it will be appropriate to help. We will be getting back to you as well.

Forever Learning

I (Roy) graduated from high school in 1969, from college in 1973, and again in 1977, later taking course work at UA and UND and teaching as well. So when does all this learning stop? One of our friends told me that she didn't want *to learn* any more things. It was a startling statement. It turns out that she has dementia and is now a very different person.

My family, my friends and my church daily offer me opportunities *to learn*, to be humble and to change for the better.

My job with computers and the management of my department confronts me with continuous challenge. I am "*always learning*" in order to cope with the many needs of my people and the technical requirements of our responsibilities. It is a constant stress, but it is a blessing and a privilege that God has allowed me to continue *to learn*
